A question about sharpening card scrapers was posted on Google Groups and discussed at the meeting.

After Show and Tell, the owners of the property, Sharon Vercellotti (Vergez) and her husband John Vercellotti, talked to us about the history of shop. the Sharon's grandfather, Auguste Vergez, immigrated from France to New Orleans, and moved to Covington in 1901. The family home at 113 E 25th Avenue, next door to the shop, is still serving as a home to his descendants. Auguste was trained as a blacksmith and a wheel wright and a gunsmith and by 1905 had built and opened the Vergez Blacksmith Shop. It was the only building in Covington with an elevator. Because Covington was a trade center at the end of a wagon trail, the blacksmith and wainwright work was very important. Hundreds

Cross the single lane bridge to enter the Abby. Turn right, go past the church, turn left. Woodshop is in the second block on left.



of ox carts would camp a few blocks away, by the current court house, carrying cotton bales and simple syrup bound for New Orleans. Auguste's son and Sharon's father, Henri, used a steam bender for the ash used to make wagon wheels. He could shape the spokes and fashion the rings to go on the axels. Wagons were lifted in the elevator to the second floor of the shop for artistic work because the light was good

there. Covington's first horse drawn pumper (fire engine) was built in this machine shop. Sharon's grandfather and father served as volunteer firemen. In 1950, Henri built a new Vergez Machine Shop next to the old shop. This is the building we are in. It currently houses Ben Bigler's woodworking and a stained glass artist's shop.
