Librarian: Jim Suarez svpanoya@gmail.com he May meeting was called to order on May 23, 2017 by Bob Busfield at the St. Joseph Abbey Woodshop. Welcome to our guest, Jim Haag.

Wayne Thompson will make arrangements to hold our annual banquet at Vintage Court on Thursday, Dec. 7, 2017. The cost will increase a little this year.

We have wood and dowels available for making boat parts for the Wooden Boat Festival. Festival dates are Oct 13 and 14. Mark your calendar. We have enough of the Surebonder 7/16" all temperature glue sticks left over from last year. Members need to bring a hot glue gun.

We will have packages of sails that need a couple of rows of stitching at the June meeting. All those who took boxes of 2x6 boat hulls home for cutting and shaping are reminded to return them as we expect to need all of them this year.

After Show and Tell we examined the various parts that can be made for the Wooden Boat Festival and discussed how to make them. We limit the number of sails to two per boat. Each member is encouraged to build a simple glue gun box to safely

hold the gun when not being used. The fear is that a child might touch the hot tip or the hot glue. An electric drill is useful, with 1/4" and 3/16" bits. This is used to drill holes for sail dowels, outriggers, and radar units.

Bob Busfield discussed safety to the woodworker when making small parts. Use zero clearance plates on table saws, band saws, and miter saws.

Cut dowels by wrapping up to fifty 3/16" dowels in blue painter's tape and then cut down to a 4" piece and discard or hand cut. The lengths of the dowels should be 1.5" for medium sized guns and 1" for small guns.

Dowels of 1" diameter make radar units, smoke stacks, winches, steering wheels, seats, and tables.

The drop off piece from a boat hull can be used for small boat parts. Scraps from the Abbey are also used. We need cabins. We ran short on shrimp boat cabins last year.

This will be our 26th year of boat building at the Wooden Boat Festival. We have never had a boat sink.

Bring a tray or shallow box, roughly 10" x 24", to collect parts into and

have at your work table.

The boat building booth is open from 10am to 4pm. Plan to arrive earlier than 10am for the first shift. If you are not staying all day, a good time for providing relief is from 12:30 to 2pm. A hot lunch is served to volunteers.

Jack Terry described how he uses Abbey cutoffs and three different saws to make gun turrets. He rips on the table saw, makes angled cuts on the band saw, and chops individual pieces on a miter saw. He drills 3/16" holes or oversizes them by 1/64".

Brian Harrell also stressed safety in


cutting small pieces. Keep fingers away from blades. Use wooden push sticks and tongs. Use a cross cut sled on both the table saw and a band saw.
